She is the author of over 20 books on contemporary art and has written art criticism for *Art in America*, *The Village Voice*, *In These Times*, and *Z Magazine*. Lippard has also curated over 50 exhibitions, done performances, comics, guerrilla theater, and edited several independent publications, the latest of which is the decidedly local “La Puente de Galisteo” in her home community of Galisteo, New Mexico. Recently, she curated an exhibition in Boulder, CO, **Weather Report: Art & Climate Change** partnering scientists and visual artist communities to begin a dialogue regarding climate change and bringing to the table ideas of how move toward a sustainable future.
